

## Celebrating Tomorrow: Make Harford History Now

This program will be held between 9:30 am and noon at the Bel Air Reckord Armory at 37 N. Main Street. The event is free, but tickets are required. ## Historic Harford: The Story Continues

Harford County's story in many ways echoes the story of the country. In 1773, the first major confrontations with the British occurred with the Boston Tea Party. Harford County very quickly took up the cause of the citizens of Boston, leading to the adoption of the Bush Declaration in March 1775. Harford County was then the population center point of the thirteen colonies that made up America. Over the next two years, the county will join the nation in several celebrations. Harford 250 was just the beginning.

In 1774, Bush or Harford Town became Harford County's first official county seat. The county seat would be moved to Bel Air in 1782. All of these local landmark events were occurring with the nation on the brink of the American Revolution which led to the Washington, Rochambeau, and Lafayette troop move-ments through the county and the establishment of Maryland as a state, no longer a colony. Over the next two years, events are planned to recognize the anniversaries of these early days in the nation, the state, and the county.

## **Bush Declaration**

Harford County's first America 250! Commemorative Event will occur on March 22, 2025, with the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Bush Declaration.

The Bush Declaration is often hailed as "the first Declaration of Independence." In reality, it was a declaration in support of the patriot cause, that was signed at the Town of Bush on March 22, 1775. It is believed to be the first (or one of the first) such resolutions drafted by an elected body in one of the colonies.

News of events across the colonies, especially the situation in Boston, reached the ears of the citizens of the newly-created Harford County. Harford's citizens were already collecting goods and money to send to the aid of the citizens of Boston. One question historians have explored is how familiar with the Bush Declaration were the men who drafted the Declaration of Independence, especially its author,

Thomas Jefferson. Certainly, men traveling by horse or horse-drawn carriage to Philadelphia from the southern colonies may have traveled through Bush on the Old Post Road. The language of the last line of each document bears uncanny similarities.

Last line of the Bush Declaration:

"we do most solemnly pledge ourselves to each other, and to our country, and engage ourselves by every tie held sacred among mankind, to perform the same at the risque of our lives and fortunes."

Last line of the Declaration of Independence:

"And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor."

## Lafayette Returns

On July 29, 1825, the Marquis de Lafayette stopped in Havre de Grace while traveling from Lancaster, Pennsylvania to Baltimore. On July 29, 2025, Harford County citizens will celebrate the anniversary of his farewell tour and welcome the Marquis to Havre de Grace once again with a festive celebration. A full program of events is being planned in preparation for this visit. These events will include living history presentations, lectures, exhibits, and theatrical and musical productions. Events will kick off in August 2024 and continue until July 2025.

The Historical Society is planning two programs celebrating the Lafayette anniversary this year. The first will be held on September 22, 2024 at the Historical Society's headquarters in Bel Air. The event will include dinner, a birthday cake celebration for Lafayette, and the appearance of reenactor, Alise Dupuy as Adrienne de Lafayette. Ms. Dupuy will share the stories of Lafayette's role in the American Revolution and the incredible story of his wife Adrienne.

In November, three local historians, Jacob Bensen, Amy Rosenkrans, and Ken Sterner, will share their year-long research on Lafayette in Harford, relaying the many stories of his time and influence here and debunking some of the myths as well. This event is planned for November 9 at the Society's Headquarters in Bel Air.



Lafayette was 66 years old when he traveled from France to New York in August 1824 to begin a jubilant tour across 24 states as the "Guest of the Na-

tion." He was given a hero's welcome everywhere he went. He ended the tour 13 months later.

What was the purpose of this "Farewell Tour?" The United States was embroiled in a very contentious presidential race and then-President James Monroe thought the country needed a morale booster. The country was also approaching its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Monroe proposed bringing back the last living American General from the American Revolution in celebration of the nation's 50 anniversary and in hopes of reigniting a feeling of patriotism. That last surviving general was Lafayette. He came—planning to stay for three months or so. He stayed a total of 13 months and was greeted everywhere with outpourings of affection. Even in places he did not visit, citizens celebrated his return.

## Salute to Bel Air at 150



## **Celebrate Maryland Archeology Month**

### PETROGYPHS AT BALD FRIAR FORD A Chronological and Geographic Study of Stone Images, With New Interpretations

Destruction of the Lower Susquehanna petroglyphs began as early as the late 1700's, with limited recording until the first photographs of 1871. Insitu study ended with the complete removal of remaining chipped stone images in 1927, during construction of the Conowingo Dam. The removal, dispersal and some loss of these specimens has hampered their organized study. Paul Cresthull of Harford County and George Reynolds, Jr. of Cecil County, both founders of a fledgling Maryland archeology program in the 1960s, were responsible for recent avocational study of these ancient artifacts. Since then, additional petroglyphs have been discovered below the Holtwood and Conowingo Dams; and the study of prehistoric migration routes has led to a new interpretation of the purpose of the examples at Bald Friar.




